




Dayton, in 1934, held the first "All-American Soap Box Derby," a race that has sparked interest in

automotive engineering in thousands of young people. There were 34 entries in the first derby, which quickly became a national sensation. Local

competitions still are held around Ohio counties, with winners coming to the event's home in Akron, Ohio every July for the World Championship race.



Myron Scott was a journalist who came up with the idea of the "Soap Box Derby." He had been reporting on a race that only allowed "home-built" race cars in Dayton Ohio. He then copyrighted the idea and helped spread the idea nationally. The first "All-American Soap Box Derby" was held in Dayton in 1934, but moved to Akron in 1935 for a more challenging terrain. The sport was so popular that a permanent track called the "Derby Downs" was built in

Akron in 1936. Derby Downs was built in a city park near the Akron Municipal Airport and the Goodyear Air Dock, where the dirigibles Macon and Akron were housed. A 1600-foot cement-paved raceway was constructed with three ten-foot lanes. The distance the cars would actually travel - 1175 feet.

The Rules

In 1937, a few new rules came into play. The age limits were changed from 6-16 to 9-15 years, and prior winners could no longer compete. Also, no car could cost more than \$10 and adult involvement was strictly prohibited. Today's rules are a little more complicated.

These days, The All-American Soap Box Derby Championship is still held annually in Akron and is comprised of 440 qualifiers from the U.S. and foreign countries. Each competitor builds his or her own gravity-powered car, with assistance from a parent or other adult, from kits purchased from the All-American Soap Box Derby. The first, second, and third place winners in each division and age group are now awarded college scholarships (up to \$5,000).

Did You Know?

- In 1934, the winners of the Soap Box Derby were Robert Turner (Muncie, IN) followed by Claude Alexander (Chattanooga, TN) and Jack Fusternberg (Omaha, NE). As first place winner in 1934, Robert Turner earned \$500. He won by only 1.4 seconds.
- Prior competitors in the Derby include: Johnny Carson (former Tonight Show host), Tom Sneva (1983 Indy 500 champion), and Cale Yarborough (multiple NASCAR WC champion).

Of Course, In Recent Years... the official race goes on, but creative minds have evolved home built vehicles into bathtub racers, Burreto Racers, Beer Can Racers and every other crazy contraption bolted to wheels you can think of. —TS

Old Business: Christmas Party checks are due on 12/01 and the checks will not be returned.


Program: Sean Ketchum fro Vintage Auto Repair a presentation on brake systems and components.

EPA appears to open the door to cutting the amount of ethanol in gasoline

While the Environmental Protection Agency has done so slower than anticipated, it has followed the Renewable Fuel Standard, which calls for steadily increasing amounts of ethanol in the nation's fuel supply, since it passed Congress more than a decade ago. That may change, however, as the EPA signaled this week it could consider using new tools that would allow the agency to reduce ethanol levels.

Nothing in the EPA's <u>Notice of Data Ability</u>, issued (__September 26__), indicates that the agency will call for cuts beyond what it already outlined in July for 2018 and 2019. Instead, the notice outlines a number of issues that agency officials believe would give them the authority to bypass the RFS, including cheap imports of renewable fuel, inadequate domestic supply, and increasing costs for biodiesel and advanced (non-corn) cellulosic ethanol.

In addition, the notice points out that the agency can make adjustments under the guise of preventing "severe economic harm," a provision already in the Renewable Fuel Standard. "In particular, we seek input on whether there is information indicating that severe economic harm is occurring under current standards or would occur for any volume requirement that could be established in the current rulemaking and, if so, whether and how volumes should be adjusted to address such harm."

While the EPA — as well as the pro-ethanol Renewable Fuels Association — routinely dismisses the concerns of collector car enthusiasts, many in the hobby have blamed ethanol-blended fuels for degrading fuel-system components in older cars and in turn requiring extensive and costly repairs. Indeed, the EPA has conceded that "there is some potential for E15 to damage older vehicles and gasoline-powered equipment" in <u>determining that the fuel is not appropriate for 2000 and older vehicles</u>.


For the first time earlier this year, the EPA proposed <u>reducing the total amount of ethanol-blended fuels</u>, from 19.28-billion gallons in 2017 to 19.24-billion gallons in 2018. The total amount of corn-based ethanol-blended fuels is projected to remain the same, at 15-billion gallons, as is the total amount of non-ethanol fuel, at 200-million gallons.

The EPA has, in the past, used waivers to stall implementation of the RFS — most notably when demand for fuels dropped, contrary to the RFS framers' anticipations — but not to reverse it. The recent notice from the agency implies that all forms of renewable fuel, not just advanced ethanol or biodiesel, may be subject to such waivers.

A public commenting period on the notice and on the EPA's waiver authority will open shortly at Regulations.gov. The EPA is expected to finalize its 2018 numbers by November 30.—-Daniel Strohl
