Legendary Cars of Cuba.

HAVANA - Barely a travel article about Cuba is published without a mention of the vintage cars that add so much color and tourist appeal to the island.

But few Americans have thought of the old gas-guzzlers as a business opportunity. Rick Shnitzler, founder of Tail Light

Diplomacy (TLD), says Cuban owners of antique autos would represent a good market for U.S. spare parts, both originals and reproductions, if U.S. firms were free to do business with Cuba. For now, however, the U.S. trade embargo on Cuba remains and all Shnitzler can do is dream, and occasionally help out his like-minded counterparts in Havana. "Recently, we were able to deliver copies of

original factory-issued sales brochures which will enable Cuba to restore its oldest car, a 1905 Cadillac Model F Touring, to factory specifications," he said. Since its formation in 2000, the nonprofit TLD has pushed hard for lifting of the U.S. ban on travel to Cuba, "TLD seeks to create the conditions for Americans to meet their Cuban peers face-to-face," a fact sheet about the organization says. "TLD advocates that Cubans conserve and maintain their existing fleet of pre-1960s American cars, trucks and motorcycles, and that Americans join with Cubans to restore this . . . patrimony as an economic asset and Cuba's contribution to worldwide 20th century culture.' Except for a handful of newer automobiles belonging to




diplomats, no American cars have been shipped to Cuba since 1960, when the Eisenhower administration imposed a ban on all U.S. exports to the island following Fidel Castro's rise to power.--*TS*-----

DMV Confusion?---You will NOT receive a notice for the registration renewal and they will not accept any money until the state budget has been settled regarding the renewal fees for registrations that will be due July 1 or later.

The following is from the DMV website <u>www.dmv.ca.gov</u>--Changes to Registration Renewals Due July 1, 2011 and Later: State law requires DMV to implement changes in the billing and renewal process for registration fees due on or after July 1, 2011.

- Registration renewal notices will be mailed out close to or on the expiration date. (Previously notices were mailed 60-days ahead of the expiration date).
- NOTE: Fees are still due for registration notices due prior to July 1, 2011.
- No money will be collected until renewal notices are issued. (Previously renewal fees could be collected up to 75 days ahead of the expiration date and were required to be collected within 30 days of expiration when part of another transaction such as a transfer of vehicle ownership)
- All customers will be given a 30-day grace period after they receive their registration notice. Penalties for delinquent payment will not be imposed until 30 days after the registration expiration date. (Previously penalties were due the day after the registration expiration date)
- Law enforcement is aware and will not cite vehicles until the first day of the second month after the vehicle registration expires. For example: A vehicle with a registration expiration date of July 10th would not be cited for delinquent registration prior to September 1, 2011.



A Pre-Tour Tune Up

This season, be ready. If your ignition points have been replaced in the last year or so, your engine starts easily and runs evenly, then you only need to do a few things to complete the annual physical before a tour of any length.

Change the oil and filter, lubricate the chassis, oil all the obvious places, and check the grease in the transmission, differential and steering gear. **Check** tire pressure (spare too!). Clean and regap the spark plugs to .025. Start the engine, warm it up to operating temperature and adjust the carburetor for idle, RPM and mixture.

Road test for 10-15 miles. This a must at this point. Stop at the turn around point and shut off the engine for about 10 minutes. It should restart and run well and without cutting out. If it seems to run out of fuel in about 30 second after restarting, you are

experiencing the first symptoms of vapor lock. **Beg, borrow, or buy a vacuum pressure gauge -** to check your fuel system. With the engine at operating temperature, ignition off, remove the fuel line at the carburetor, attach the gauge hose to the line from the pump, start, let it idle, and read the fuel pressure. If less than 3 pounds repair or replace the fuel pump or push rod to get a reading of 3.5 to 4.5 pounds. If all is well or after repairs, reconnect everything, start the engine and connect the vacuum gauge to the to the vacuum line on the intake manifold. At idle, adjust carb mixture screws to obtain the highest reading. The engine should the smoothest at this setting. This tune up will last at least a full touring season and probably a lot more. -- Chester Lawrence, *Courtesy The Rumble Sheet, reprinted from Vibrations, but they got it from Road Clatter.*



World's First Air-Powered Car: Zero Emissions by Next Summer

India's largest automaker, Tata Motors, is set to start producing the world's first commercial airpowered vehicle. The Air Car, developed by ex-Formula One engineer Guy Ngre for Luxembourgbased MDI, uses compressed air, as opposed to the gasoline-and-oxygen explosions of internalcombustion models, to push its engine's pistons. Some 6000 zero-emissions Air Cars are scheduled to hit Indian streets by August 2011. The Air Car, called the "MiniCAT" seats six, could cost around Rs. 3,475,225 (\$8,177.00) in India and would have a range of around 300 km between refuels. The cost of a refill would be about Rs. 85 (\$2.00). Put a V8 body on it and you'd have something... *TS*

spurs - \$10,625. (He never used spurs on Trigger.)

A life size shooting gallery - \$27,500.

Various western style chandeliers sold from \$6,875 to \$20,000. A signed photograph by Don Larsen taken during his perfect game in the 1953 world series against the Dodgers, along with a signed baseball to Rov from Don. sold for \$2,500. Two fabulous limited edition BB guns in their original boxes with numerous photos of Roy, Dale, Gabby, and Pat -\$3,750. A collection of memorabilia from his shows entertaining the troops in Vietnam sold for \$938. His flight jacket - \$7,500. His set of dinner ware plates and silverware -\$11,875. The Bible they used at the dinner table - \$8,750. One of several of his guitars sold for \$27,500. Nellybelle, the Jeep, sold for \$116,500. A fabulous painting of Roy, Dale, Pat, Buttermilk, Trigger, and Bullet -\$10,625. One of several sets of movie posters- \$18,750. Roy's custom-built '32 Woody (Bought when his name was still Leonard Slve) sold for \$27,500. A black and white photograph of Gene Autry with a touching inscription from Gene to Roy sold for \$17,500. A Republic Productions Poster bearing many autographs of the people that played in Roy's movies - \$11,875. Dale's horse, Buttermilk sold below the presale estimate (30-40 K) for \$25.000. Bullet sold for \$35,000. He was their real pet. Dale's parade saddle - \$104,500. One of many pairs of Roy's boots sold for \$21,250. Trigger sold for \$266,500. So it's "So Long" to Roy and Dale, it was a great ride through childhood.



Burning rubber for over 100 years

Damp memories of the Big 3.

In 1895 Harvey Firestone was working for the Columbus Buggy Works when Henry Ford walked into his store and bought a set of tires. Ten years later the Firestone Tire & Rubber Company received another PO from Ford. This was the largest single order yet placed by an auto manufacturer. It was for Firestone's new and superior pneumatic tires. By 1919 nearly one half of the 5.5 million cars in the United States trusted Firestone tires.

Rubber farm tires were Firestone's own idea. In 1935 after more than four years of development he introduced the Ground Grip tire. In 1936 the company held a large sales conference called "Rubber on the Farm". It featured



32 different implements on rubber tires. The salesmen were sold and soon after- the farmers. In 1937 the Ground Grip Type R tire was introduced and highly promoted. During that same year Firestone opened it's 561st company store, won it's 18th consecutive Indy 500, and became unionized. Harvey Firestone died in 1938. In 1945 all five of his sons sat on the board of directors. Talk about a

family business

One day in July of '99, my friend Russ Flick from PA called and said he had heard about a

'41 Ford wagon that originally belonged to a movie star. I kind of laughed and told him I would look at it when I came down to the August Macungie PA show. When we got to Meyerstown, PA, Russ took us down a narrow alley into a small garage. There sat a nice, solid looking wagon, which had an old repaint of the original light grey color. The wood was exceptional. I started it up and backed it out of the tiny garage. I was elated at the overall condition.



The wood was exceptional. I didn't really care who had previously owned it, even if it was the devil himself, I wanted it. My wife and I went to the seller and bought it. Then the fun really began. The owner and his mother brought out a cork board with supporting dispositions of ownership from their uncle who had received the wagon from Tyrone Power's ranch. It was documented that he worked on Power's ranch. The car was given to him in the late forties. He kept it, even when he moved to PA in later years. Along with the dispositions, and other documentations supporting the history of the vehicle: another pleasant surprise was finding a Ford factory promotional photo of Power with his car in front of a Ford Dealership. We were able to use the photo to check the original wood structure, wood grain and match it to the car

So Tyrone Power may be gone, but the car is in a home that appreciates it.


