
Fred and I

When Fred was 14 and I was 17, one day he said that there was a 1932 Ford 5 window coupe for sale for \$50. I still don't know how he knew that. I drove my 1937 Ford 60 horse power sedan to Groton, Mass, no more than ten miles away.

Outside the house was a grandfatherly man and a young boy, next to them was the 5w coupe. I started it, it sounded OK, so Fred said "Give him 50 bucks". We moved the front license plate to the rear of the coupe. I drove the coupe, Fred drove the '37. I parked the coupe behind the Steele's garage.

The next day I went to Fred's place, looked out the rear window at the car. I was cursing myself for buying the thing. It was just an old car. Fred knew better. He read every word in all of the Hot Rod Magazines, and being precocious, remembered every detail. '32s were THE car to have. Of course it needed a V8 engine, not a 4 cylinder. We removed the hood and radiator, unbolted the hardware holding the engine in place, shook and pulled the engine until it fell onto the ground and the wishbone. Obviously we didn't have a plan. Should have

driven it into the garage and borrowed a chainfalls. We tried to lift the front of the car by the bumper. Too heavy. Needed another person to do the job. We walked to Donny Morses house, he was there, we explained



the problem and he said he would help.


We suggested Donny take the middle of the bumper, Fred and I, the ends. Before we knew it, the bumper was three feet or more in the air and neither Fred or I had lifted yet, we were splitting our sides laughing. We told him to move the front of the car sideways to let the engine fall off the wishbone. Success, and Donny went home shaking his head. Next we went to Jim Downey's junk yard to find a V8 engine. There was a 1937 Ford that Jim said was almost new. \$25. As he lifted the engine with his wrecker,

a fan, bolted to the crankshaft came into view, meaning it was newer than a '37. 1939 to 1941! I didn't point that out to Jim, \$25. was enough.

Next, a radiator, we swapped the 4cyl. for a V8 plus \$10. It didn't leak. I don't remember where the transmission came from. I bought a dual carb manifold for \$25. Did nothing to the distributor or coil. Fred said we had to get rid of the fenders and hood. The engine came with the exhaust pipe to, but not including, the muffler. I had a used glass pack muffler, a slide fit into the pipe.

That's the way I drove it for about a year and a half. A state cop stopped me and asked where my muffler was. I said it was at the chrome plater's. He said to put it on soon. Next I got stopped by another statie, he asked where the fenders were, I said they were at the body shop, he said to tell them to hurry up.

That was in the fabulous '50s.

Hot '32 Ford with Flame Job to be restored.

New V8 member Don Pettee has a project. This straight and solid '32 5 window coupe was caught in a garage fire. Paint was roasted, glass burnt out, front tires melted off the rims, but surprisingly, the body metal is not warped, the upholstery only singed and the car is restorable.



"History of my '32 Ford 5 window:

The car was purchased by the seller's (Jerry Sams) grandfather for his father (Dave Sams) in 1947 in Columbia, Oregon. The Grandfather gave the car to Dave and at that time the original V8 was swapped out for the 4 cylinder now in the car. In 1960 the family moved to Ferndale, California where Dave was a teacher in the local high school. He drove the Ford to

work and around town. Ferndale is a historic Victorian town about half the size of Coronado and a perfect spot to drive a '32 Ford. In 1998 Dave gave the car to his son Jerry from Eureka, California - he used it sparingly for local shows. Jerry had it stored in a larger building with a 1957 Sudebaker Hawk. The building burned, damaging the Ford and destroying the Hawk. That was 2003. Jerry began to restore the Ford, but still had a long way to go when he sold it to me. It runs fine, but needs paint, glass, interior and tires. So far I've stripped and powder coated all body panels, prepped for running and brakes working. I plan to finish the restoration, rebuild the original V8 and swap it in for use around Coronado. Wish me luck." --Don Pettee.

Summer Drive Ins, cool dates and hot wheels.

There was a time when \$5 Bucks would get you two tickets to the Drive In, a couple of gallons of gas, snacks during the movie and a burger after. But cheap as it was, we still tried to sneak in.

“**The first drive-in theater** I ever snuck into in San Diego was also the first one built here, the Midway, on the northwest corner of Mission Bay Drive and Sports Arena Boulevard.

It was December 1979, and I was already camping out for concert tix in the nearby arena parking lot (Frank Zappa, well worth the cold 'n' cramps). Friends held our spots while three of us went down the road to attempt sneaking into the single-screen Midway to see Star Trek: The Motion Picture, with no plan as to what we'd do once inside (I guess we assumed we could sit near a speaker pole and not be noticed).

Dusty-yellow and surrounded by palm trees, the Midway's sloping hollow wall proved easy enough to scale, but it made the damndest noise as we slid down the other side, and it was obvious that half the lot was staring at us. As soon as our feet hit the pavement, some guys rolled up in a beach-buggy-style cart and hauled us off the premises to the sound of paying patrons laughing as we were wheeled past their comfy, warm cars and dropped outside the exit gate.

I vowed to return as soon as I owned a car, and before long I did have a vehicle (of sorts, an old Rambler) and I was frequenting every outdoor movie screen I could find within safe driving distance of downtown (about 45 miles, given my dicey wheels). I had become a so-called "ozoner." -Jay Allen Sanford

THE MIDWAY Drive-In was constructed in 1947 at the intersection of Midway Drive and Sports Arena Boulevard, back when the Boulevard was still Frontier Street and Navy barracks stood on acreage later occupied by a FedMart. The Midway Drive-In Theatre Corporation was incorporated July 31, 1946, with Floyd Bernard Jr. listed as company president. Soon, Joseph Shure and his Shure Theatres Inc. bought into the drive-in, though Bernard maintained his stake for the entire life of the theater, later working with his son Dusty Bernard and Dusty's wife Lynn.

Built by Floyd Bernard, Jr., the Midway screened its first film – Body and Soul starring James Garfield -- in February 1947. Tickets were 75 cents, and Bernard was later quoted saying “We made \$6,300 the very first week...that was a lot of money in those days.”

Originally designed for 400 cars, the screen tower was anchored by large poles sunk into what had once been swamp grounds. It was an enclosed structure that included storage rooms and a small efficiency apartment briefly occupied by various theater employees.

The first screen was a canvas-style flat that rolled open over a scaffolding tower, and there were no individual car speakers, only bullhorn-style broadcast speakers designed by RCA Victor, a system called "Directional Sound," where three loudspeakers were mounted near the screen.

By late 1948, individual car speakers on poles protruded from cement islands sprinkling the lot. The original snack bar was a makeshift Quonset hut in front of the screen, though this was later replaced with a standard concession building, sitting in the middle of the lot, a few feet below the rest of the graded property. From that point onward, the projection booth was located on top of the concession stand. There were also bleacher-style benches for up to 200 walk-ins.



Early gimmicks used to get patrons parking included free baby bottle warmers, a real-cloth diaper service, in-car heaters, a free car wash from nearby screen-ad sponsor Genie ("with the magic towel!"), whose sign was lined up alongside the Midway marquee. Later, "by-the-carload" pricing was instituted, as the Midway and several other local ozones competed to top each other's 'All-Fer-One' ticketing. The Screen tower would double as an advertising billboard for the nearby 'Pie Piper' restaurant and a 'Heavenly Donuts' that outlived the Drive-In itself.

John Wayne unexpectedly showed up at the Midway in either 1951 or 1952. “We were showing ‘Hondo’,” Floyd Bernard’s son Dusty told one San Diego paper (9-8-80), “and he walked right into the snack bar and started shaking hands with everybody. He was really nice to all of us.”

In 1953, theater operators Sero Amusements Company (who had tried and failed to launch San Diego’s first drive-in on the lot the Frontier Drive-in later occupied) purchased 30,000 of the 110,000 outstanding shares of common stock in the Midway Drive-In Theatre Corporation. In the mid-fifties, the entire lot was paved over, expanding the lot to fit around 700 cars. The company would later run the nearby Frontier Drive-In (which morphed into the Frontier Twin), the Rancho Drive-In (at Federal and Euclid), Chula Vista's Big Sky Drive-In, and other local ozones. In a modernization project spearheaded by Dusty Bernard. “When we finished,” he says, “we each took a car to all the speaker locations, to make sure that the view of the screen was perfect from everywhere in the lot.” At that time, the Midway was one of 60 Midway Drive-Ins operating in the U.S. Theater co-owner Bernard was living in the apartment built into the screen tower itself, along with his mother and sister.

The first 70mm screening was 'King of Kings', starring Jeffrey Hunter as Jesus, beginning April 11, 1962, and shown in "Super Technirama 70." A 70mm reissue of 'Oklahoma!' ran at the Midway beginning April 25 and attracted big crowds. However, by the time 'Spartacus' debuted in 70mm at the Midway attendance was falling. In the '60s, the Midway enlarged its screen to 75 feet by 120 feet to better display widescreen Cinema-Scope features.






Motoruota: The Monowheel That Might've




